

Overview

- 5.1 miles | 3.8 miles dedicated lanes
- Ten (10) proposed stations nine (9) new
- Seven (7) 60' articulated buses

Recent Milestone

• FTA CIG Ratings – "Medium-High" with full funding recommendation in FY24 President's Budget Proposal (\$85.9M)

Next Steps

• Complete 30% design & begin final design – Summer 2023


NORTHERN CORRIDOR

SYSTEM FACTS

Corridor: 8.2 mi. (Martin Luther King Junior Blvd., South Columbia St., and US 15-501 South), from Eubanks Rd Park & Ride to Southern Village Park & Ride


Dedicated, curb-running transit lanes: 5.7 mi.

Stations: 17 BRT stations with near-level boarding

Vehicles: 14 high-capacity BRT buses

Service: 7 days; 5 AM – 11 PM (weekdays), 8 AM – 11 PM (weekends); Fri/Sat extended to 1 AM when UNC in session

System Enhancements: Traffic signal priority (TSP) and multiuse path along much of corridor



PROJECT INFO

Projected Launch Date: 2029


Capital Cost (YOE): \$178M(approx.)

Committed Local Funding: \$31.1M*


FTA Small Starts Grant: \$150M

Annual O & M costs: \$1.4 million (est.)

IMD Planning Initiatives



7 workshops across the state and technical assistance

Prepares agencies to leverage IIJA funding and provides resources for visioning, prioritizing goals, and ongoing support for implementation



Mobility as a Service (MaaS) Seamlessly plan-book-pay for travel across all modes

Assesses the availability and feasibility of MaaS services for a statewide platform



254 grants + \$8.0M

Develops comprehensive bicycle plans and pedestrian plans with an added transit component

Promotes coordinated regional planning across agency boundaries, consolidating requirements for state and federal funding programs



Feasibility Studies / Research / Grants

Assesses the feasibility of introducing microtransit to complement or replace fixed-route and demand response services throughout the state



Freeway And Street-based Transit

Makes recommendations and provides techniques for improving North Carolina roads for buses so people can rely on public transportation to get to work, education, shopping and recreational activities.

FAST 2.0 Overview

- Accelerate the implementation of Freeway, Arterial, Street, and Tactical (FAST) transit priority infrastructure
 - Make our freeways and regional boulevards "transit ready."
- Develop BRT corridors including connections to RDU Airport
- Advance SMART (Systematic Management of Adaptable Roadways through Technology) freeway corridors
- Formulate a regional vision, goals and brand for transit and mobility

Freeway, Arterial, Street, and Tactical (FAST) transit is a scalable approach for quickly integrating "transit advantage" infrastructure along the roadway system to support enhanced transit service. The "FAST" approach prioritizes transit efficiency and reliability while improving mobility for all users.

FAST 2.0 Potential Focus Strategies

- Primary focus on freeways and regional boulevards
- Improved transit rider experience and expanded Bus on Shoulder System (BOSS)
- Express lanes with transit priority
- BRT or FAST transit linkages
- Transit signal priority standardization
- New and improved bus stop/station designs or layouts
- Bike/ped access improvements

FAST 2.0 Primary Deliverables

- Vision and brand for multimodal transportation in the Triangle Region
- Actionable materials for planners and other transit and transportation professionals
- Accessible marketing materials for the public to gain understanding and support for FAST transit network
- Improvements that will benefit all users, not just transit


